now available in paperback for the first time this classic work presents a cognitive semiotic framework for understanding how maps work as powerful abstract and synthetic spatial representations explored are the ways in which the many representational choices inherent in mapping interact with information processing and knowledge construction and how the resulting insights can be used to make informed symbolization and design decisions a new preface to the paperback edition situates the book within the context of contemporary technologies as the nature of maps continues to evolve alan maceachren emphasizes the ongoing need to think systematically about the ways people interact with and use spatial information

mapping a critical introduction to cartography and gis is an introduction to the critical issues surrounding mapping and geographic information systems gis across a wide range of disciplines for the non specialist reader examines the key influences geographic information systems gis and cartography have on the study of geography and other related disciplines represents the first in depth summary of the new cartography that has appeared since the early 1990s provides an explanation of what this new critical cartography is why it is important and how it is relevant to a broad interdisciplinary set of readers presents theoretical discussion supplemented with real world case studies brings together both a technical understanding of gis and mapping as well as sensitivity to the importance of theory

this book is the fruition of work from contributors to the art and cartography cartography and art symposium held in vienna in february 2008 this meeting brought together cartographers who were interested in the design and aesthetics elements of cartography and artists who use maps as the basis for their art or who incorporate place and space in their expressions the outcome of bringing together these like minds culminated in a wonderful event spanning three evenings and two days in the austrian capital papers exhi tions and installations provided a forum for appreciating the endeavors of artists and cartographers and their representations of geography as well as indulging in an expansive and expressive occasion attendees were able to re ect on their own work and discuss similar elements in each other s work it also allowed cartographers and artists to discuss the potential for collaboration in future research and development to recognise the signi cance of this event paper authors were invited to further develop their work and contribute chapters to this book we believe that this book marks both a signi cant occasion in vienna and a starting point for future collabo tive efforts between artists and cartographers the editors would like to acknowledge the work of manuela schmidt and felix ortag who undertook the task of the design and layout of the chapters

founded by the british cartographic society bcs and first published in june 1964 the cartographic journal was the first general distribution english language journal in cartography this volume of classic papers and accompanying invited reflections brings together some of the key papers to celebrate 50 years of publication it is a celebration of the cartographic journal and of the work that scholars cartographers and map makers have published which have made it the foremost international journal of cartography the intention here is to bring a flavor of the breadth of the journal in one volume spanning the history to date as a reference work it highlights some of the very best work and perhaps allows readers to discover or re discover a paper from the annals as we constantly strive for new work and new insights we must t ignore the vast repository of material that has gone before it is this that has shaped cartography as it exists today and as new research contributes to the discipline which will continue to do so

maps in newspapers generated many discussions among cartographers and geographers working from different approaches and theoretical backgrounds this work examines these maps from a historiographical as well as a historical perspective it considers three main questions namely how maps in the press should be conceptualized how cartographic images in newspapers have been studied and how these images changed over time in order to provide a perspective on the origins

development and impact of war maps in the press we will explore maps representing three geopolitical conflicts for brazilian audiences the war of the triple alliance 1864 1870 the world war ii 1939 1945 and the war on drugs in rio de janeiro s favelas 1994 2010 by exploring maps on these wars we will identify specific cartographic practices used in this genre as well as the connections that this mode has with other types of map production and consumption

since its launch in 1987 the history of cartography series has garnered critical acclaim and sparked a new generation of interdisciplinary scholarship cartography in the european enlightenment the highly anticipated fourth volume offers a comprehensive overview of the cartographic practices of europeans russians and the ottomans both at home and in overseas territories from 1650 to 1800 the social and intellectual changes that swept enlightenment europe also transformed many of its mapmaking practices a new emphasis on geometric principles gave rise to improved tools for measuring and mapping the world even as large scale cartographic projects became possible under the aegis of powerful states yet older mapping practices persisted enlightenment cartography encompassed a wide variety of processes for making circulating and using maps of different types the volume s more than four hundred encyclopedic articles explore the era s mapping covering topics both detailed such as geodetic surveying thematic mapping and map collecting and broad such as women and cartography cartography and the economy and the art and design of maps copious bibliographical references and nearly one thousand full color illustrations complement the detailed entries

in his most ambitious work to date edney questions the very concept of cartography to argue that this flawed ideal has hobbled the study of maps susan schulten author of a history of america in 100 maps over the past four decades the volumes published in the landmark history of cartography series have both chronicled and encouraged scholarship about maps and mapping practices across time and space as the current director of the project that has produced these volumes matthew he deney has a unique vantage point for understanding what cartography has come to mean and include in this book edney disavows the term cartography rejecting the notion that maps represent an undifferentiated category of objects for study rather than treating maps as a single unified group he argues scholars need to take a processual approach that examines specific types of maps sea charts versus thematic maps for example in the context of the unique circumstances of their production circulation and consumption to illuminate this bold argument edney chronicles precisely how the ideal of cartography that has developed in the west since 1800 has gone astray by exposing the flaws in this ideal his book challenges everyone who studies maps and mapping practices to reexamine their approach to the topic the study of cartography will never be the same an intellectually bracing and marvellously provocative account of how the mythical ideal of cartography developed over time and in the process distorted our understanding of maps times higher education cartography the ideal and its history offers both a sharp critique of current practice and a call to reorient the field of map studies a landmark contribution kären wigen coeditor of time in maps

this text describes late 1990s understanding of map generalisation in the context of paper maps and gis its particular value should be in helping to further automate and measure the process of map generalisation the research has concentrated on quantifying generalisation effects and on analysing how these effects of generalisation locked into the maps were measured elsa joao s book covers the background to the problems of map generalisation the methodology developed by

the author to investigate the consequences of the map generalisation a detailed description of results and a conclusion that draws together consequences for the broader applications to gis

addresses the fundamental principles of visual perception and map symbolism and critically examines the assumptions behind the theories of psychophysical testing and cartographic communication this revised and expanded edition includes new sections on the relationship between cartography and art and the distinction between knowledge and skill

map making and ultimately map thinking is ubiquitous across literature cosmology mathematics psychology and genetics we partition summarize organize and clarify our world via spatialized representations our maps and more generally our representations seduce and persuade they build and destroy they are the ultimate record of empires and of our evolving comprehension of our world this book is about the promises and perils of map thinking maps are purpose driven abstractions discarding detail to highlight only particular features of a territory by preserving certain features at the expense of others they can be used to reinforce a privileged position when maps become the world shows us how the scientific theories models and concepts we use to intervene in the world function as maps and explores the consequences of this both good and bad we increasingly understand the world around us in terms of models to the extent that we often take the models for reality winther explains how in time our historical representations in science in cartography and in our stories about ourselves replace individual memories and become dominant social narratives they become reality and they can remake the world
